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European Ceramic Core Workshop

Held on Tuesday 25th & Wednesday 26th September 2007 at the Blayson Conference Centre, Cambridge, Blayson, Carpenter Certech, LBBC Technologies and Blade Tooling hosted a workshop on best practice for the use of ceramic cores. Production tours of wax manufacture at Blayson and core manufacture at Certech's Corby facility were included.



This was the second event on the subject and on this occasion was aimed at European investment casting foundries. Twenty two delegates from as far as Sweden, Israel and Turkey attended the workshop which also featured a guided tour of Cambridge and a dinner at St Catharine's College.

The focus was on the primary operations of the investment casting process involving the practical issues with regard to ceramic core materials and production, wax injection around them and the removal of the core. A paper on tool design and building by Neil France of Blade Tooling was presented and proved to be of great interest.

With the growth in their application for investment castings, the increasing complexity of internal passages and the ability to cast net shape monolithic components, the successful injection of the ceramic core in the wax pattern and removal of the ceramic core from the casting are paramount to the viability of the cast component. Correct tool design and build from the outset is critical.

The concept was that suppliers have a responsibility to pass on their knowledge and experience to both current and future generations of engineers, and most importantly to listen and learn from their customers. The workshop proved an ideal vehicle for this and some excellent interaction took place.

Reaction from the delegates indicates that the workshop was judged a great success and that a repeat event in the future would be welcomed.

Wax Developments

The continuing programme of R&D into new wax material and testing regimes is yielding some important developments.

The drive to find process related test methods that give practical guidance to foundries to facilitate best injection performance is looking very promising. The use of a pressure sensor in a specially made die is proving invaluable. The use of this together with a 'spiral die' is giving new insights into what happens inside the die when wax is injected.

New wax materials are close to completing initial development stages with the intention to release them for industrial scale production trials in the very near future.
